Vision statement

Morningside College is a student-centered participatory community, offering a liberal arts curriculum combined with a diverse array of practical experiences. The goal is the development of the whole person through an emphasis on critical thinking, effective communication, cultural understanding, practical wisdom, spiritual discernment, and ethical action. The Morningside College graduate is equipped for both personal and professional success.



Profile

Historical Background

Morningside College was founded in 1894 by the Methodist Episcopal Church as a private, four-year, coeducational, liberal arts institution. The college remains affiliated with the United Methodist Church.

Academic Year

Morningside operates on a two-semester system with sessions from late August to December and January to May. Evening classes are offered each semester. There is one summer session of classes and a May Term, which provides opportunity for travel and study outside the regular curriculum. In addition, service learning is integrated into the curriculum and several opportunities for internships are available.

Enrollment

Morningside enrolls more than 1,000 full-time students, representing more than 20 states and several foreign countries.

Co-Curricular Activities and Cultural Events

Students participate in a wide variety of activities including departmental, professional, and religious organizations, honor societies, sororities, and fraternities. A college newspaper, the *Collegian Reporter*; a literary magazine, *The Kiosk*; a college radio station, KMSC Fusion 88.3; and a college television studio, MCTV, are under student direction. Intercollegiate varsity athletics and intramural activities are available for both men and women. Music recitals and concerts, theatre productions, and lecture series are held each semester.

Services for students

Counseling

A **personal counselor** is available for student consultations and/or referrals to local counseling services. The personal counselor supervises educational programming on common student concerns such as stress management and coordinates accommodation for students with documented disabilities who are not in our Focus program. Questions about services offered by the personal counselor can be directed to (712) 274-5606.

Morningside's **career counselor** meets with students who are exploring and have not yet determined which major is best for them. The career counselor also assists students in finding internships or part-time employment off campus, helps students develop resumes, and publicizes opportunities for students to interview with employers visiting campus. For further information, contact the career counselor at (712) 274-5254.

The personal growth and development of each student is the goal of Student Services at Morningside College. Our objective is to provide programs and services for students that will enhance their college experience and provide opportunities for success. Full-time students receive a student handbook annually at the time of validation that outlines campus and residence hall policies and regulations, available services and facilities, and a statement of the rights, freedoms, and responsibilities of students at the college.

Academic Advising is coordinated through the office of the Dean for Advising. Each student meets with a faculty or staff advisor as they plan classes at their first registration. Once admitted, students are assigned to faculty advisors. Later they are able to select an advisor in the department in which they plan to major. Contact the Dean for Advising at (712) 274-5252 if you have further questions.

The **Academic Support Services Center** provides free tutoring for all Morningside College students. Staffed by professional and student tutors, the center provides help with writing techniques, mathematics, and various other academic disciplines. Tutors are available during both daytime and nighttime hours.

Services for students

Employment for students

Morningside College provides work opportunities on campus under the Federal College Work-Study program. Off-campus employment at non-profit and community service organizations is also available. The student must demonstrate financial need to participate in the Work-Study program. A job fair is held the first week of school to assist students in finding a job. Students needing additional assistance in finding a work-study or campus employment position can contact the Student Financial Planning Office at 712-274-5159. Off campus, part-time jobs are also posted in the Student Services office.

The Focus program

Designed for students with a documented learning disability or documented attention deficit disorder, the Focus program teaches students essential skills and learning strategies necessary to be successful at college. The comprehensive program offers individual and group tutoring, specialized software and hardware, academic advising, and individual meetings with specially trained advisors.

Health services

Student Health Services, located in the lower level of the Olsen Student Center, is staffed during the academic year by a registered nurse. Local physicians have regularly scheduled hours each semester. All records are confidential and cannot be shared without a student's permission. Students carrying nine credit hours or more may see the nurse or doctor free of charge.

Office hours for the nurse are:

Health care insurance is required.

Morningside College offers insurance through the Student Services office for an annual fee. Claim forms may be obtained in Student Health Services. In case of extended illness, hospitalization, or family emergencies, Student Services should be notified by calling 712-274-5104. In cases of minor illness that cause a student to miss class, the student is responsible for informing instructors.

Services for students

Housing

All full-time students who have not attained senior class standing (minimum of 91 credit hours) are required to live in on-campus college housing. This policy does not apply to students who live at home or with near relatives and commute to college. Available housing options include Roadman Hall, Dimmitt Hall, the Residence Complex, and the Poppen and Waitt Apartments.

All residence halls have:

- Free cable television hook-up
- Public kitchen facilities with stove, microwave, and fridge
- Phones with voice-mail access
- Coin laundry facilities
- Vending machines
- Computer print station
- Study and TV lounges
- Game room
- Information desk (except apartments).



There are no areas for storage of personal items, furniture, boxes, or bicycles during the school year or the summer months. We ask that students **DO NOT** bring the following items:

- Microwaves
- Candles
- Air conditioners
- Incense
- Pets (except fish)
- Any appliance with exposed heating elements
- Halogen lamps
- Phones are provided for all students.*

*Rooms in the Waitt and Poppen Apartments and in Roadman South have analog phone lines, which support standard and cordless phones. Students residing in these areas are allowed to bring in their own phones, if desired.

Services for students

Meal plans

Each resident student **must subscribe to a meal plan**. Morningside offers different meal plans from which the student may choose. Morningside College contracts with a food service company to provide campus meals to residence hall students. Buckingham's Snack Bar (Buck's), in the lower level of Olsen Student Center, serves meals and snacks on weekdays. The Spoonholder Café, located in the Hickman-Johnson-Furrow Learning Center, also serves a variety of coffee, other drinks, and desserts. "Food Bucks" can be used at Buck's or the Spoonholder Café and may be purchased in the Food Service Office or by calling (712) 274-5177.



Notebook computer program

Morningside College provides all new, full-time students with a notebook computer. The campus-wide network connects every residence hall, lab, classroom, and office computer to the Internet and the World Wide Web. Students have continuous access to e-mail and the campus library's online resources, as well as catalogs of thousands of other libraries via the Internet. Computer print stations equipped with laser printers are located in each residence hall and are accessible to residents of that building 24 hours a day. Commuter students have access to printers located in the Hickman-Johnson-Furrow Learning Center during its regular hours of operation.

Student financial planning

712-274-5159

Purpose

The office of Student Financial Planning provides financial aid for the following purposes:

- Scholarships to encourage students of high scholastic ability and/or co-curricular activities, especially in the areas of art, theatre, and/or music
- Grants to students who demonstrate financial need
- Employment opportunities and loans to assist qualified students in supplementing their financial resources.

How to apply

1. File formal application for admission. Submit all required admissions credentials as requested by the Admissions Office.
2. Submit a FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA) form to Federal Student Aid Programs after January 1 of each year. This form is available from the office of Student Financial Planning. This application can also be completed electronically at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Request that FAFSA information be sent to Morningside College (code number 001879).

Campus and academic regulations

Academic integrity

Academic integrity is basic to all academic activities so that grades and degrees will have validity.

Morningside College expects its students to:

- perform their academic work honestly and fairly
- not hinder other students in their academic work
- not unfairly assist other students.

These expectations and the penalties for not meeting these expectations are outlined in the college catalog and the student handbook. A student in doubt about his or her responsibility as a scholar or unsure whether a particular action is appropriate should consult the instructor of the course. For further explanation and information, please refer to the college catalog or the office of Academic Affairs.



Requirements for graduation

Morningside College confers five baccalaureate degrees: Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Bachelor of Music, and Bachelor of Music Education. For a Bachelor of Arts degree, no more than 40 semester hours may be required for the major. For a Bachelor of Science degree, no more than 56 semester hours may be required for the major. In the major, no more than 36 hours can be from one prefix and no more than 52 hours from two prefixes. The major in the Bachelor of Science must include courses to fulfill the empirical reasoning and quantitative reasoning requirements. No more than 52 semester hours in a prefix will count toward the 124-hour graduation requirement. Any additional hours will extend the 124-hour graduation requirement. A minimum of 124 semester hours is required for completion of the baccalaureate degree. These hours include the general studies, the requirements for a major and a cluster, and in many cases, requirements for a minor and electives.

Grading system

Morningside College uses alphabetic characters to indicate levels of achievement in courses. Grades with + or - are recorded as follows:

Requirements for Dean's List

At the close of each regular semester, those students who have earned a 3.67 grade point average on at least 12 credit hours of completed and graded course work with no grade below a "C-" are named to the Dean's List. Courses taken on a pass/fail or audit option do not count toward the 12 hours of completed course work. Completed grades for courses where an "Incomplete" was initially recorded will be calculated in the grade point average for the semester in which the "Incomplete" was removed.

Class standing

A student's class standing is determined as follows:

First Year (FR)	0-26.99 hours
Sophomore (SO)	27-57.99 hours
Junior (JR)	58-90.00 hours
Senior (SR)	91 hours and above

Course load

The standard unit of work is the semester hour. A full-time student is one who is enrolled for at least 12 semester hours of class work. The normal load for a student is 16 hours. A student may enroll in up to 18 hours per semester. A student with a minimum 3.50 cumulative grade point average may enroll in up to 20 hours per semester. Any other student wishing to enroll in more than 18 hours per semester must have the approval of the Academic Dean. No student may take more than 20 hours per semester.

Campus and academic regulations

Student privacy

We know you are concerned about your student's progress at Morningside. Student education records are official and confidential documents protected by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, commonly referred to as FERPA. The rules regarding FERPA rights apply to any student who has reached the age of 18 or who is enrolled in a postsecondary institution, regardless of age. The records cannot be released to any third party, *including you*, unless one of the following conditions has been met:

- Through the written consent of the student (forms are available in Student Services or the Registrar's Office)
- In compliance with a subpoena
- By submission of evidence that the parent declared the student as a dependent on their most recent federal income tax form.

The best way to find out how your student is doing is simply to ask him or her directly. Additionally, students can provide their parents with access to academic and financial records through "Campus Web" on the college's Web site at www.morningside.edu. In order to do this, you will need your student's login and personal identification number (PIN).

Morningside College may also disclose "directory" information without the student's prior consent.

Directory information is defined as:

- Name
- Local and permanent addresses
- Telephone number(s)
- E-mail address
- Date and place of birth
- Major or field(s) of study
- Dates of attendance
- Grade level
- Enrollment status (FT/PT; undergraduate/graduate)
- Degrees, awards, and honors received and dates
- Expected date of completion of degree requirements and graduation
- Participation in officially recognized activities and sports
- Weight and height of members of athletic teams
- Most recent educational institution attended
- Photograph.

Students have the right to prevent directory information from being released. In order to maintain directory information as confidential, a student must sign a non-release form in Student Services by the end of the second week of the fall semester. This release restriction is effective only for that academic year and must be filed each year.

Campus and academic regulations

Alcoholic beverages

No student may bring, keep, or drink alcoholic beverages on the campus with the exception of individual residence hall rooms and then only if the student is of legal age to consume alcohol in Iowa and under the provisions set forth in the Residence Hall Alcoholic Beverages Policy. Any student who violates this regulation is subject to disciplinary action.

Drug use and abuse

Possession of stimulant, depressant, narcotic, or hallucinogenic drugs, including marijuana and other agents having the potential for abuse, except on a physician's prescription, is strictly prohibited. Any student found to be possessing, using, or distributing such drugs will be subject to severe disciplinary action.

Suspension

Morningside reserves the right to terminate relations with a student for disciplinary, academic, or health reasons. In a disciplinary case, the student is assured opportunity for a hearing and full explanation of charges against him or her. In the case of suspension for academic reasons, the student has the privilege to review the case. In a case of dismissal involving the student's health, the college exercises the prerogative of deciding whether a student's continued presence jeopardizes his or her own welfare or that of others in the college community.

Discontinuance

Students who are discontinued may not enroll at Morningside College for a least five years.

Services for parents



We want the parents of our students to stay connected not only with your student but with the college as well. You are a valuable partner in your child's educational process. To keep you engaged, Morningside offers a variety of services, programs, and events that can facilitate your interaction with your student and with the campus community as a whole.

Parent orientation

During orientation festivities each fall, parents of new students are invited to a question and answer session with the academic dean and vice president of Student Services, the matriculation of students, and a special reception.

Family Weekend

Each year, Morningside hosts its Family Weekend, a time when parents and siblings of Morningside students gather together to share food, fun, and fellowship. From concerts to athletic events, theatre productions to potluck dinners, Family Weekend is a great time to relax with your student and absorb the Morningside College atmosphere.

Services for parents

The Morningsider

The Morningsider is the official magazine for Morningside College and is published twice a year, usually in November/December and May/June. The magazine is distributed free-of-charge nationwide to more than 15,000 alumni and friends of the college, including parents.

E-newsletters

On The Move, an electronic newsletter, is distributed each month to members of the Morningside community, including parents, alumni, and friends of the college. The newsletter is a great way to stay in touch with recent events at the college, learn about campus developments, hear about student projects, or discover more about faculty research. Subscription to the electronic newsletter is a free service and is elective.

Bookstore

Here's your chance to show your Morningside spirit! The college Bookstore offers a wide variety of merchandise that's perfect for sending to that special someone on campus, from Morningside insignia items such as sweatshirts and T-shirts to specially designed gift bags. Parents Council

The goal of the Parents Council is to develop and implement programs that will involve parents in ways that are meaningful to them and beneficial to the college. The council is comprised of parents of current students. The council conducts its work through subcommittees that focus on assisting in the college's admissions efforts and assisting in the planning of family events.

Frequently asked questions

Q: What are the dates that I need to know for school vacations?

A: You can find important dates on the calendar inserted in this manual or by logging on to www.morningside.edu and checking the "Calendar" listing.

Q: Does my student need a meal plan?

A: Each resident student must subscribe to a meal plan. Morningside offers different meal plans from which the student may choose.

Q: Is my student required to live on campus?

A: Morningside College places great value on residential living as an integral part of your student's academic and personal growth. To that end, we require that all full-time students who have not attained senior class standing (minimum of 91 credit hours) live in on-campus college housing. This policy does not apply to students who live at home or with near relatives and commute to college.

Q: What happens if my student has a roommate conflict?

A: We understand that living with someone new can be a big adjustment. However, we ask that students give their living arrangements at least six weeks before requesting a roommate reassignment. During that time, residence life staff members are readily available to help resolve roommate conflicts when possible or assist in reassignment if necessary. Questions regarding residence life can be directed to the residence life director at 712-274-5161.

Q: When does my student need to declare a major?

A: All students must declare with the Registrar a major and degree sought during their second or third semester or after completion of 16 college credits.

Q: What immunizations are necessary?

A: Immunizations required for admission include:

- Diphtheria/Pertussis/Tetanus (DPT) series and DT booster within the past 10 years
- Polio, series of three
- Measles/Mumps/ Rubella (MMR), series of two
- Tuberculosis screening for international students, for those entering the health professions, and others as outlined on the student health record. If international students have a positive PPD test, they must present an actual X-ray to the college.

In addition, the following immunizations are encouraged:

- Varicella vaccine or history of chicken pox disease
- Meningitis vaccine
- Hepatitis A vaccine, series of two if given individually, or three if given in combination with Hepatitis B.
- Hepatitis B, series of three.

The month and year of each immunization, as well as the name of the office that administered it, should be recorded on the student health record prior to admission. Immunization requirements are subject to change based on public health standards. Any of the required immunizations can be purchased through Student Health. Questions regarding student health concerns can be directed to 712-274-5178.

Frequently asked questions

Q: Does my student need to make an appointment in order to see a campus doctor or nurse?

A: Not at this time. Student Health Services is operated on a walk-in basis with a wait time of less than 10 minutes.

Q: Who will provide the medical care for my student?

A: Student Health Services is staffed during the academic year by a registered nurse. In addition, two doctors and two nurse practitioners staff one-hour clinics four days per week.

Q: Does it cost to see the doctor or nurse?

A: On-campus services are free to students who take nine or more credit hours and who have paid the required health fees for admission. Any off-campus services will require insurance or cash. Student Health Services does not have pharmacy, lab, or X-ray services, which would all require personal payment.

Q: Can I speak to Student Health Services about my student?

A: Only if the student has signed a release of information allowing health center providers to speak with you specifically. The federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) protects medical records of those over 18 years of age.

Q: How can I find out what's happening on campus?

A: Parents can log on to the college's Web site at www.morningside.edu to read the latest news releases or to check the online calendar of events. You can also subscribe to the college's student-run weekly newspaper, the *Collegian Reporter*, by calling 712-274-5481 or read current or past issues at [http:// webs.morningside.edu/masscomm/TheCR/Index.html](http://webs.morningside.edu/masscomm/TheCR/Index.html).

In addition, you can listen to music or hear live broadcasts of several of Morningside's athletic events by tuning in to the campus radio station, KMSC Fusion 88.3 on the FM dial, or online at <http://webs.morningside.edu/masscomm/KMSC/listen.html>.

Q: How will I be notified if there's an emergency that involves my student?

A: If your student sustains an illness or injury that is not life-threatening, the student is responsible for notifying their next of kin. If the student sustains a life-threatening illness or injury, the college will notify the person(s) listed on the emergency contact form that was completed when the student enrolled in the college.

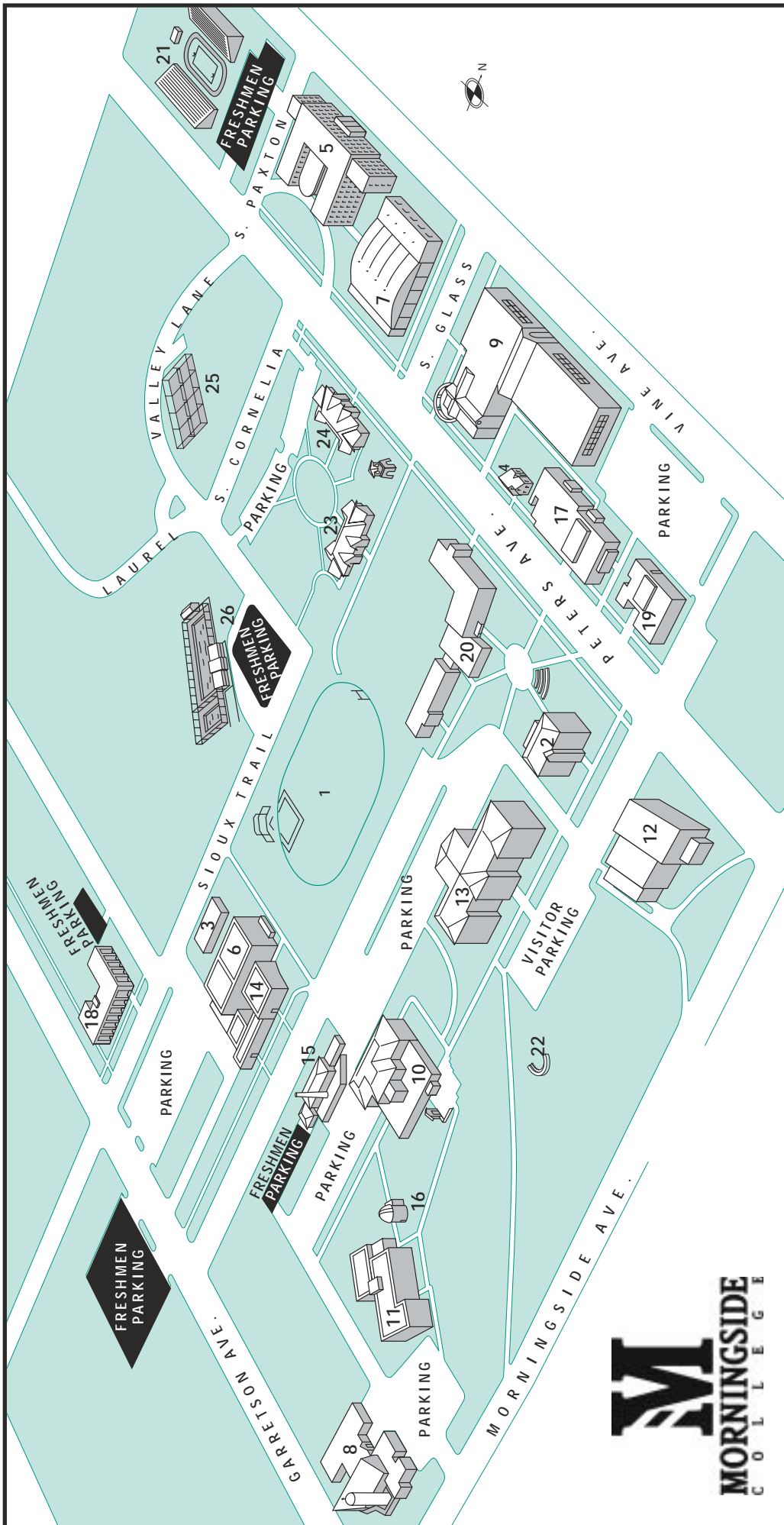
